

6-Hour Workshop - \$95 12 pm - 6 pm EST, Wednesday, January 21

Spend a day playing with Evolon, a super-soft yet strong non-woven fiber that has many art quilt applications. We'll experiment with a variety of techniques to transform Evolon through layers of faux-dyeing, sun printing, mark making, painting, stamping, stenciling, raw-edge applique, and discuss options for adding stitched texture! You'll leave with lots of swatches, ideas, and inspiration to incorporate Evolon into your fiber art!



All Levels

Students to Provide

Evolon Non-Woven Fiber—you can order sampler packs of Evolon Non-Woven fiber for use during class from these US-based companies. Please note that this is the minimum for use with workshop play, although you may want to order extra to continue the fiber fun beyond class:- click here - please order at least 2 of the 15.7" x 15.7" sheets and sub cut into 18 squares measuring approximately 5.25" OR Click here - order one sample pack of 8.5" x 11" and sub cut 4-5 of the sheets into quadrants measuring 4.25" x 5.5".

Paints/Inks:

- You will need at least one or more 2.25oz jars of liquid acrylic fabric paint, such as Jacquard's Dye-Na-Flow or ProChem ProSilk & Fabric paint for the morning.
- One or more 2-oz bottles of acrylic craft paints. Mel's favorites are DecoArt Dazzling Metallics, DecoArt Extreme Sheen, and Folk Art Color Shift Paints which have a pearlescent/metallic sheen. Other options are Apple Barrel, Dick Blick, DecoArt, and Folk Art matte or gloss finish. These are readily available at most craft supply stores.
- One or more dark-colored ink pads. Recommended brands include: Tsukineko VersaFine Claire (Nocturne or Medieval Blue); Tsukineko Memento Luxe (Tuxedo Black or Nautical Blue); and/or Ranger Archival Ink Jet Black.

One or more items for use with sun (or sunless) printing. Objects need to be non-porous (plastic, metal, glass), lay flat, and have holes. Recommended items include: plastic stencils, small pressed vinyl coasters/placemats; vinyl sink/bathtub mats, needlepoint plastic canvas sheet/shapes; flat glass marbles/rocks, keys, and/or reusable paper plate holders.

Household items for use with mark making (start saving now to have a few options on hand): assorted small bottle lids (i.e., soda, medication bottles, etc.), Lego bricks, toilet paper tubes, bubble wrap, highlighter/pen/pencil, gift/hotel key card, plastic forks, wooden

chopsticks from takeout.

Paint Mixing & Mark Making Supplies:

- o 3-4 plastic spoons for mixing (with option to use a 10ml syringe)
- o 10 small plastic cups (4oz or bigger)
- o 2 or more 6" squares of freezer paper
- o One adhesive foam sheet (sticker-backed craft foam readily sold in the kids section of most art/craft supply stores. You are welcome to supplement with sticker-backed foam shapes: stars, hearts, circles, squares, etc. Avoid any glitter/textured foam.
- o 1-2 cardboard boxes from your recycling bin and/or old CDs and/or small flooring samples (~3-4")
- o 2-3 foam dauber and/or makeup wedge
- o 1-2 6" paper plates/cardboard boxes to use as a paint palette

Work station set up:

- o Plastic tablecloth/garbage bag to protect your work surface
- o Paper towels/old rags/baby wipes to clean up paint/messes
- o Access to water (small pint-sized yogurt containers work well to have water at your work station and refill as needed)
- o A flat surface for your fabrics to dry (indoors or outdoors)--a small fan can speed up the indoor drying time
- o 10+ gallon-sized Ziploc bags
- o Permanent marker
- o 1-2 pairs of latex or nitrile gloves
- o Iron/ironing board (for use in the second half of class)
- o 7" x 18" or bigger piece of parchment paper to protect your iron/surface
- o A 12" square rotary ruler works well for transporting your painted samples to your drying area
- o Small flat rocks/marbles to keep samples from blowing away if working/drying outdoors o Wearing an apron/smock is highly recommended to protect your clothing from paint drops/splashes

The items below are completely optional for layering more creative play into your Evolon samples:

o Your favorite stamps (rubber, clear acrylic, foam, and/or hand-carved stamps) o Your favorite stencils (6" or 9")

- -For more interest, you can add: 4 or more coordinating fat quarters and/or half yard cuts, 2.5" strips from a jelly roll and/or 10" squares from a layer cake
- **Here are some helpful hints regarding fabric selections:
- Solids & small scale prints that read as solids will help your spiral designs pop!
- Consider including 1 or more zinger fabrics: stripes, dots and/or ombres (especially ones that gradually change in color/value from selvedge to selvedge)
- Sewing machine in good working order with 1/4" piecing foot
- Neutral piecing thread
- Cutting supplies: rotary cutter, cutting mat 18" or larger, 12" square ruler and a 24" ruler -Iron & iron pad

- o Pressing Spray (i.e., Maryellen's)
- o 12" or 13" rotating cutting mat

6-Hour Workshop - \$110 10 am - 4 pm EST, Wednesday, January 21

Discover the beauty hidden in simple stones. In this relaxed and inspiring class, you'll learn how to create fabric "rocks," appliqué them to a background, and bring them to life with simple hand stitches. Using real rocks as inspiration—or letting the fabric's natural marks guide you—



you'll explore line, texture, and embellishment in a playful way. No stress, just slow stitching and plenty of creativity. By the end, you'll have a unique piece filled with character and the quiet charm of nature's designs.

All Levels

Students to Provide

Fabric to appliqué the rocks on (if working with blocks, at least 8" \times 8"; if working on one larger piece - 16" \times 16") - could be all different or all the same

Cotton, linen, silk, rayon in light colours

Fabric for rocks - at least 6" x 6"

hand-dyed fabrics, batik, painted

Thread for appliquéing the rocks - I use 80 wt. or 100 wt.

Hand-sewing needles - size to suit your threads

Embroidery threads - cotton, linen, silk - in a variety of colours - solids or variegated Embroidery floss, 12 wt. embroidery thread, 8 wt. embroidery thread

Rotary cutting mat

Rotary cutter

Ruler

Paper Scissors

Fabric scissors

A sheet of template plastic

Pins

Thin cardboard (like from file folders)

Pencil and eraser

SH13-006 - Monoprinting: from Basics to Sophistication

6-Hour Workshop - \$120 10 am - 4 pm EST, Thursday, January 22

Discover the joy of monoprinting, a wonderfully painterly printmaking technique where spontaneity reigns and no two prints are ever alike. In this hands-on class, students will explore water-based paints on gelli plates, experimenting with masking, multiple drop printing, colour mixing, and a variety of textures. We'll begin by creating custom stamps, which will be used to add unique patterns to your prints. Throughout



the session, you'll have the freedom to play with unexpected materials, producing several pieces that can either stand alone as a finished body of work or serve as dynamic underpaintings for future projects. Warning: Monoprinting is incredibly fun...and highly addictive!

All Levels

Students to Provide

- •Gelli plate- 8" x 10" works well
- •4" soft rubber brayer (Speedball is readily available) if you have a hard one, that will work as well
- •Optional: an extra brayer
- Plastic to cover the table with

Fabric:

- •½ yard of muslin or inexpensive fabric or an old fabric to use as a drop cloth under your printing plate
- •You can monoprint on any fabric. The tighter the weave, the cleaner the print.
- •For the class, and to experiment, white fabric or light coloured is best, solid colour, as it will show your prints better. Consider that when choosing, but the choice is yours
- o Keep in mind the colour of your paints. White fabric will show your prints better than a coloured fabric, which will change the colour of the print if you are using transparent paint. more on paints below
- o If you have some metallic paints, you may want to try some dark fabric: black, navy blue, dark green, etc.
- •Use PFD fabric (prepared for dyeing) if possible, which has no finishes. Otherwise, consider washing your fabric first (your choice). Do not use fabric softener or dryer sheets. Washing is important if you are going to wash the final product.
- •Cotton fabrics, quilting quality, tight weave, work best for clean crisp prints, but you could also monoprint on silk, wool, velvet, even batting! Have a few pieces of different fabrics

handy – if you have some – to experiment and see what happens.

To prepare the fabric for the workshop:

- •Consider pre-cutting the fabric to the size of your printing plate plus 2". That will give you enough area to work with and extra for sewing later. Prepare around 20 pieces. You can always cut more during the class.
- •A fat quarter or a half meter to print multiple prints on the same piece of fabric optional
- •A piece of organza or sheer fabric (optional) large enough for your gelli plate.

NOTE: How many monoprinted pieces you end up with will depend on how you work. I'll be showing lots of different techniques and expect you to try them all, so you'll have a repertoire of samples to refer to in the future.

- •Consider having a fat quarter or half-meter of additional fabric next to your gelli plate (or a few) to clean the brayer on. You'll end up with a beautiful piece of fabric to use in your work.
 - o You can use some commercial prints to change the colour of them.
- o You can also use copy paper for this if you want to use them in your sketchbook or in your collages. A magazine or old book will work as well.

Paints:

- •In the colours of your choice. It can be acrylic paint or fabric paint or a mix of both
 - o Remember that paints come in your choice of transparent, opaque and metallic.
- Transparent paints are good to use on light-coloured fabrics and will show the pattern underneath if you use on patterned fabrics
- Opaque fabrics contain chalk which makes them opaque so they are good to use on dark fabrics for good coverage. Of course, you can also use them on light-coloured fabrics. They'll have good coverage.
- Metallic paints contain mica which gives them the metallic look. They are opaquer and are good to use on both light-coloured and dark-coloured fabrics
- o If you are using acrylic paints and are making something that will be washed, consider adding Fabric Medium to the paints so they will be launderable.
- If you are using the fabrics in wall-hangings and art pieces, the fabric medium is not necessary as the final pieces will not be washed.
- If you are using textile or fabric paints, the fabric medium is already added to them and are launderable after heat setting.

Miscellaneous:

- •Thin Cardboard such as old file folders or cereal box cardboard or posterboard 3-4 pieces large enough to cover your gelli plate
- •X-acto Knife (works better than a small craft knife)
- Cutting mat
- •1" chip brush (the inexpensive kind)

- •Tissue paper white and coloured as desired (to clean the gelli plate with) Optional or a few sheets of deli paper
- •Temporary Spray Adhesive such as Odif 505 or 202
- Paper towels
- •Spray bottle with water optional
- •A wooden kebab stick or a chopstick
- Paper scissors
- A few sheets of copy paper
- •Painter's tape or masking tape
- •A couple of plastic or Styrofoam plates to use as paint palettes (no paper plates)
- Disposable gloves if you don't like to get your hands dirty
- •Commercial stencils any that you have if you purchase, 2 of your choice (large enough to cover the gelli plate)
- •Stamps / foam stamps any that you have
- o There are lots of expensive stencils and stamps in stores. Dollar Stores are great to get some inexpensive stencils and stamps if you are looking to purchase some. I also found some at Walmart.
- Baby wipes (optional)
- •A package of Post It Notes (optional) to mark your fabric with the steps you took to make that sample

Supplies for making Stamps:

- •1 sheet of foam core board
- Self-adhesive foam sheets

o I find the self-adhesive foam sheets in packages at Walmart or Michaels. They are also available on Amazon. If you cannot find the self-adhesive foam sheets, regular work too but you'll need a glue stick to attach them to the foam core board.

NOTE: There's an optional kit with all supplies needed to make the stamps plus some other goodies in my website at www.anabuzzalino.com/store under Kits. Please allow plenty of time for the kit to arrive before class.

- •Q-tips
- A bit of Saran wrap
- Combs
- •A piece of Bubble wrap
- Corks
- Shelf liner
- Mesh
- •Etc.

Phyllis Cullen SH13-007 - Flower Power

6-Hour Workshop - \$75 12 pm - 6 pm EST, Thursday, January 22

We'll use scraps of your liveliest prints in three values of one color, or of all the colors you want to combine to create your own tropical flower. We'll chop up our fabrics, divide them into values, and fill in the valuemarked pattern sections with corresponding value pieces of fabric. Add a bit of tulle, and



some simple quilting, and you will have created your unique impressionist masterpiece. Choose a hibiscus, rose, or bird of paradise. Choose your color scheme. Let me collect the fabrics for you and send a ready to assemble kit (optional).

All Levels

An Optional Kit is available with everything but a rotary cutter and mat, glue stick and sharpie. See workshop #SH13-007A. A second optional kit is also available, #SH13-007B and includes a different full-size pattern, Steam a Seam, with appropriate fabrics in the chosen colorway.

- ➤ Full size pattern and photo of my completed version of the pattern. (will be emailed to enlarge)
- ➤ Sheet of Steam-a-Seam 2, 18" wide
- Three sets of fabric pieces with a variety of values (light, medium, dark) 2- or 3-inch pieces are fine. They should be prints or batiks, can be multicolored or predominantly one or more warm or cool color. The more the merrier but at least 5 fabrics of light to medium prints, medium value prints with mixed colors or primarily one and dark scraps that can be solids, muted dark prints, any cool colors or mostly purple.
- ➤ A Sharpie marker, for tracing the pattern
- ➤ A Glue Stick, for sticking down loose pieces
- ➤ Background fabric: variety of green print scraps
- Fine mesh Tulle, about 24" square black, dark blue, forest green or dark purple
- ≥24" square of batting and backing of choice



Goals:


- 1. Understand how to use tones, tints, and shades to create depth.

All Levels

Students to Provide

- Fabrics in a single-color family (solids, prints, and textures in light, medium, and dark values). Bring a big mix of scraps and fat quarters to experiment with.
- Rotary cutter and cutting mat
- Fabric scissors
- Rulers: 6"x12" for cutting fabric, small drawing ruler for drafting designs
- Sketchpad/paper, pencil, glue stick and colored pencils
- Sewing machine, thread, iron and ironing surface
- Stitch ripper (just in case)

MODERN QUILT DESIGN, INSPIRED BY CLASSIC ART

Bring your own photo of a work of art, and we

will explore the many ways you can take inspiration from it to develop your own quilt block or full quilt design. We will break down the image to its most basic elements, create a rough drawing, then start building a test block using improv techniques. David will demonstrate sewing curves without pins, and without fear. A PDF materials and supplies list will be emailed in advance.

WORKSHOP OVERVIEW

- •Experiment with different elemental geometric shapes, including gentle curves
- •Explore spare, simple compositions for a modern look
- •Consider the sewing lines as a key design element.
- •Select one work of art, and bring 1-2 photocopies of it to class
- •Break the artwork down into elemental blocks
- •Assess which blocks work well, and choose one to translate into fabric
- •Discuss color and value choices and decide on a palette
- •Map out pieces for one composition
- •Cut out fabric pieces improv style
- Audition colors and placement
- •Build composition improv style, trying out multiple fabrics, stepping back to assess the effect of each
- How do I quilt it? See a demo of how to add texture and surface design with walking foot quilting.

I will provide full hands-on instructions in class. Bring 1-2 photocopies of your art inspiration, and we'll create a new work inspired by your selection. This is an all-levels workshop. Basic knowledge of machine piecing is helpful, but not necessary. We will learn together!

CONTINUED: SH13-013 - Inspired by Art

Students to Provide

- •2–3 photos of works of art that you like: painting, print, photography, drawing or sculpture... it's up to you. It doesn't have to be a Japanese artwork or artist. Be inspired by shapes, colors, structure, or the feeling you get when looking at the artwork. I have supplied examples of Japanese woodblock prints (ukiyo-e) if you would like to use them. Please have color hard copies of the images you like best.
- •8-10 fabrics, in a range of values, patterns, and textures. Fat quarters to half yards work great for this project. Fabrics that read as a solid are easier to work with than strong patterns. Bring at least one solid dark fabric, and one solid white or off white. You will select a few fabrics to use, but you will want a range to choose from. You do not need to match the colors of your artwork, but feel free to be inspired by the colors you see.
- •Standard cotton quilt batting for a design wall, about 24" x 24". Tape this up so you can experiment with your composition, and step back to see the results. Have your phone/camera handy to take pictures of your progress!
- •Cotton sewing thread for piecing in a neutral color, like medium grey. I prefer 50 wt. thread.

- •Domestic sewing machine with quarter-inch seam allowance foot, or standard foot
- •Fresh machine sewing needle: 80/12
- Rotary cutter
- Scissors for paper and fabric shears

David Owen Hastings SH14-014 - Mini Mid-Mod Quilts

3-Hour Workshop - \$80 12 pm - 3 pm EST, Saturday, January 24

These charming little quilts are inspired by Mid-Century Modern design, and are a great skill-building project to learn a number of quilting techniques.

WORK SMALL, WORK SMART, LOOK GREAT.

We will start with a simple, modern color palette of neutral fabrics with a flash of color. Clean lines combined with simple design give each tiny composition a sophisticated feeling. Since we are



working very small, this is a great project for using small scraps and bits of special fabric. Participants will learn the quilt-as-you-go method, and a PDF materials and supplies list will be emailed in advance. Hand stitching adds a sleek, linear element. Finishing techniques will be demonstrated.

WORKSHOP OVERVIEW

- •Select a range of neutral fabrics (all light, medium, or dark), and a bright accent color. Solids and subtle, small-scale prints or textures work best.
- •Cut cotton batting and backing fabric into 5" squares.
- •Cut a selection of the neutral fabrics into small strips (sizes will be provided).
- •Cut a small amount of the bright accent color fabric.
- •Learn the quilt-as-you-go technique, working from the inside out.
- Explore strip piecing and leaving the raw edges on the outside for extra texture.
- •Trim your small quilt blocks and stay stitch the edges.
- •Learn about hand stitching, and experiment with adding your own design.
- •Sew the backing onto the top of your mini quilts, leaving a space for turning.
- •Turn and press, then do a final stitching around the perimeter.

A complete PDF supply list, plus step-by-step notes and templates, will be emailed to each participant. Class sizes are limited to ensure one-on-one time. This is an all-levels class. You should be comfortable using your sewing machine, and it should be in good working order. I look forward to sharing and sewing with you!

All Levels

Students to Provide

- •Cotton sewing thread: 40- or 50-weight, medium grey
- •Cotton batting: cut into 5" x 5" squares (cut 6–8)
- •Cotton backing: cut into 5" x 5" squares (cut 6–8)

CONTINUED: SH13-014 - Mini Mid-Mod Quilts

- •6–8 neutral fabrics: choose solid or subtly printed quilting cotton fabrics in a neutral color family. Very subtle textures are OK, but no strong prints, please. Choose colors in one family with similar values, such as ALL light grey, ALL medium grey, ALL black, ALL tan, ALL navy, etc. If you use prints, make sure they are very small and low contrast. Yarn dyed wovens are nice for this project and provide a texture contrast to the printed cottons. Cut into 4" x 6" pieces (cut 3–4 each).
- •Accent fabrics: choose 3 strong, bright, modern colors they can be from one color family with different values. Solids or subtle textures/prints. Cut two: 4" x 6", cut one: 1.5" x 6", cut one: 1.25" x 6". Bring a little extra of your accent fabrics, up to an eighth yard each.
 •#8 or #12 perle hand quilting cotton thread.

Please cut the 5" x 5" squares of backing and batting to size before class, so you can have as much time as possible to work on your mini quilts. You will receive a PDF handout with directions — the directions are notes for your reference to use during class. You do not need to do any sewing in advance.



Lisa Hofmann-Maurer SH13-015 - Perfectly Imperfect

3-Hour Workshop - \$65 12 pm - 3 pm EST, Wednesday, January 21

In this 3-hour workshop, we'll explore improv curves by piecing a few blocks of my "perfectly imperfect quilt". In my teaching journey, I noticed that a lot of quilters are afraid of "the curve" and won't even



try piecing one. In this class, we'll approach the curves from an improvisational side. Students will learn how to piece those "imperfect" curves and will get a lot of practice doing so. Later on – if you desire – you might even be able to sew a "perfect" curve, just because it was so much fun sewing those "imperfect" ones. And if you're a seasoned curve piecer you'll learn my technique on how to approach those improv curves without the use of templates or a lot of planning.

We will also talk a little bit about color, fabric choice and value of colors. We will aim to make a smaller project or the beginning of a larger piece. It's going to be a lot of fun!

For this class, you need to be able to cut with a rotary cutter and sew a 1/4inch seam. The class will help you get confident with those curves and will add a great new technique to your improv toolbox.

All Levels

Students to Provide

Fabric requirements for the Perfectly Imperfect Workshop:

It's very difficult to give exact fabric amounts and measurements when sewing improv curves. A good selection of different fabrics is very helpful; you might want to use a mix of prints and solids. You can use scraps or fat quarters from your stash in coordinating colors for accents and contrast. We will only use a small amount of fabric in the class, and the final amount needed will depend on the number of blocks you want to make. The background fabric is the biggest piece you'll need and should measure at least 8 x 8 inches. Please bring at least 3 pieces of larger quilting cotton fabric scraps (at least 8 x 8 inches) for the background and smaller quilting cotton fabric scraps in many colors (at least 6 x 1.5 inches). In this course, we will not complete a project. If you want to, you can complete your project later at home by practicing what you have learned in class.

3-Hour Workshop - \$65 12 pm – 3 pm EST, Thursday, January 22

In this 3-hour workshop, we'll explore the improv curves by piecing an improv curved log cabin. Have you always wanted to sew an improvised curve, but haven't found the courage yet? Have you tried it before, but your fabric just wouldn't lay flat? In this workshop, students will



learn Lisa's techniques and will afterwards approach those curves with confidence.

We also address the question: How do I choose colors and fabrics for an impressive quilt? How do I choose a color scheme that is pleasing to the eye? What is value of colors and how does it help me make a convincing choice of color and fabric? We will aim to make a smaller project or the beginning of a larger piece. It's going to be a lot of fun!

For this class, you need to be able to cut with a rotary cutter and sew a 1/4inch seam. The class will help you get confident with those curves and will add a great new technique to your improv tool box.

All Levels

Students to Provide

Fabric requirements for the Whirlpool Workshop:

It's very difficult to give exact fabric amounts and measurements when working on an improv piece. A good selection of different fabrics is very helpful; you might want to use a mix of prints and solids. You can use scraps or fat quarters from your stash in coordinating colors for accents and contrast. We will only use a small amount of fabric in the class and the final amount needed will depend on the quilt top you want to make. Please bring as much as possible of larger quilting cotton fabric scraps (at least 10 x 6 inch) in many colors. SH13-017 - There's More Than One Way

3-Hour Workshop - \$90 10 am - 1 pm EST, Friday, January 23

Overlapping arrows crisscross every which way in this colorful, modern quilt. Constructed of squares and half-square triangles only, the use of transparency plays a starring role in creating a compelling visual design. In this workshop, we'll cover examples of transparency as a design element and how to create transparency in our own designs, discuss helpful tools to guide our color decisions, and learn tips for creating



precise half-square triangles and piecing accurate seams. Students can expect to get a good jump on making their quilt in class and finishing it on their own at home.

All Levels

The workshop fee includes the \$22 class pattern that will be emailed to students digitally. Pattern comes with two size options (FULL/DOUBLE or LAP/THROW), all directions, color layout, blank line art of quilt design to experiment with your own color palette, and project ideas for extra half-square triangles (HSTs).

Students to Provide
