SH11-001 - Matilda

3-Hour Workshop - \$85 4 pm - 7pm EDT, Wednesday, March 26

I got the inspiration for **MATILDA** when I was doing my daily walk (well... maybe not daily). I wanted to design a quilt that had simple flowers and eventually this came into my mind – and I drew it out as soon as I could.

I started off doing a smaller block (4 inches) – and because it looked so cute, I drafted it as a 6-inch block. Because it was such a simple block, I used colourful fabric for each 6-inch block background. When I put my 6-inch blocks together into a 12-inch block, I loved it so much I decided to do a few more



blocks... which grew and grew. I'm not sure if I've finished it yet.

This virtual workshop will teach you **my** basics for needleturn applique, straight line applique, curves, points in leaves, circles, and stems. I will teach you how to prepare your shapes as well as how to glue them onto a background fabric using a **lightbox** – which is essential for my class. Using a lightbox eliminates many steps in the prep process that I used to do many years ago (in the dark ages.) For me, needleturn applique **must** be fun – it does not have to be accurate. Our "perceived" mistakes are all part of the charm of quilts – in fact, I like to say that "perfection is overrated" in needleturn applique.

This is an interactive workshop where I explain and demonstrate each step in detail, then I give you time to complete the step before I continue to the next step. So, you work side by side with me. While working on your quilt you will have lots of time to ask questions. The workshop runs for 3 hours.

- Matilda Pattern Matilda pattern. You can buy the pdf pattern from my website at www.focusonquilts.com.au. The pattern is a 6-inch block. If you feel that this is too small for you you can enlarge it on a printer. Please laminate your pattern (all will be revealed during the class ©)
- Background Fabric I used a variety of background fabrics checks, stripes, some scripts all "low volume" in a variety of colours orange, yellow, green, blue, cream, black/white, grey (see photo above) For the class, please bring one 6/12" square already prepped.
 So... cut 4 @ 3 1/2" squares and sew them together.
- Vases I used browns and greys for the vases. In my 12 ½ inch block I used the same browns/grey for the four vases. (See photo). A 7-inch x 4 ½-inch rectangle will make 4 vases.
- Stems I used two different green fabrics for the stems and leaves for the whole quilt. Stems are ¼." Please bring to the class 3 @ 11" long bias strips of fabric cut@ 5/8" wide.
- Flowers I used all the colours here blue, red, pink, yellow, orange and (dare I say it?).... purple. Choose 2 fabrics one for the flower and a contrasting fabric for the circle in the middle. A 9-inch x 2-inch rectangle will give you 3 flowers (unless you want to fussy cut, then you will require a larger piece) A 4 ½ inch by 1 ½ inch rectangle will give you 3 circles (unless you want to fussy cut your circles, then you will require a larger piece)
- Roxanne's Glue I like the small bottle as it has a small "spout" which is easy to unplug if any glue gets stuck in it.
- Ironing Board/Iron
 Light Box (This is essential for the workshop.)
- Circles Karen Kay Buckley Circles available from her website: https://www.karenkaybuckley.com/store.php?cat=2
- Fabric Markers FriXion pens are great as they disappear with heat. I usually use the black pens. These are the two that I use. The retractable pens have a fine point (Pilot FriXion Clicker Retractable Gel Ink Pens, Eraseable, Fine Point 0.7 mm, Black Ink (314505P) I love the felt tipped pens which are great for ease of drawing. (FriXion Colors Erasable Marker) Pens, Bold Point, Assorted Color Inks 12-Pack (44155) These products are available from Amazon.

- Cotton Thread I use Aurifil 50W colours 2900 or 2325 or Wonderfil Efina 60W EFS29 or EFS15.

- Small embroidery scissors for appliqué

SH11-002 - Little Blooms

3-Hour Workshop - \$85 4 pm - 7 pm EDT, Thursday, March 27

Little Blooms is a one block quilt. The beauty of this quilt is the large range and colour of fabrics that are used. Backgrounds are made up of low volume fabrics with pale colours. The flowers and vase are a riot of colour – so raid your stash to make your quilt vibrant with colour! The flowers are made up of 9 wedges of fabric of the same colour. The flowers are English Paper pieced. There are 13 different shaped vases.

You can make your quilt as large as you want – just add more rows of blocks. In the workshop I will talk about my use of vibrant colour and how to make your quilts colourful.... How I choose fabric without procrastinating!!!

The workshop will teach you how to prepare your flowers using English Paper piecing. You will also learn how to do straight line applique, needleturn applique particularly doing points easily and how to make easy peasy stems.

Background Fabric Background for each block is cut at 10 inches x 6 inches. I used an
assortment of background fabrics. (Check out the photo.) I chose low volume with
"colour": Cream with thin green stripes, Cream with yellow stripes, Cream with yellow
checks, Newsprint fabric, Cream with spots in various colours. Fat quarters are good – you
get a variety of colour.

- Vases I wanted my vases to stand out so I chose "interesting" fabrics. (See photo.) I decided to make my quilt as bright as possible so there is contrast in every block particularly between the flowers and the vase. So, play around with this and have fun in the process.
- Stems I used one green fabric for all my stems.
- Leaves I used an assortment of green fabrics.
- Flowers I used lots and lots of different coloured fabrics.

For the class please bring:

- Background 10" x 6"
- Vase 4 ½" x 6"
- Flowers small scraps of fabric of the same colour
- Stem 10" square of fabric
- Leaves 5" x 2 1/2" piece of green fabric
- English Paper Piecing papers (if you chose to purchase the pdf pattern and not hard copy)
- Roxanne's glue I like this small bottle as it has a small "spout" which is easy to unplug if any glue gets stuck in it.
- Needles I use Jeana Kimball No. 10 straw needles.
- LIGHT BOX This is essential for the workshop
- Circles Karen Kay Buckley Circles available from most quilt shops https://www.karenkaybuckley.com/store.php?cat=2
- Fabric Markers

SH11-003 - Mermaid Garden - Fabric Book or Mini Quilt

6-Hour Workshop - \$110 10 am - 4 pm EDT, Wednesday, March 26

Remember as a child dreaming of the underwater world with beautiful Mermaids ... all the glistening shells and sea foliage. Explore this "Mermaid Garden" with Susan as you learn embellishing techniques and hand embroidery. Then we will applique with hand embroidery and 3-D stitch to create textures for each page of your fabric book. Stamping on fabric and highlighting using crayons! We will focus on one page, but more will be discussed. If you don't want to create a little fabric book you can frame them to hang on a wall or bunting over a bed.

Two-Day Workshop - \$180

12 pm - 6 pm EDT, Wednesday & Thursday, March 26-27

In this workshop, we will be creating blocks that can be easily assembled to make a quilt top of any size. You may also choose to make a pillow cover, or a set of three. We will discuss motifs, as this is a very important aspect of this course. You may also choose to tell a "color story" which I will discuss in further detail during the workshop. You will leave this workshop with the ability to create shapes that are not possible to do with traditional piecing. You will also learn how you may combine the two!

All Levels

Students to Provide

- 100% cotton fabric, preferably solids and/or textured solids. LIGHT/MED/DARK VALUES FOR EACH COLOR IF POSSIBLE (details below)
 Textured prints are welcome in this workshop. Fat quarter packs will also work well.
- Sewing machine (Your sewing machine must play well with very fine thread.)
- Superior Threads MonoPoly™ Thread (Only this brand, and make sure it is translucent and not black.) (This can be purchased via Amazon.)
- Lightbox for tracing (which can be purchased on Amazon or an art supply/hobby store)
 - CLICK HERE to see what is available on Amazon.
- Needles (Microtex Sharps #60/8 or #70/10) This is very important because you will be sewing with very fine thread.
- Freezer paper
- Regular black Sharpie. (This is a black marker and it's totally water resistant. It must be
 black and be a Sharpie, no other brand or color. (Also, not thin, or super thick, just the
 normal size. You will understand why in class...)
- Liquid Stitch fabric glue (I find this works best, but if you have a favorite brand, that's fine too.)
- Straight pins
- Old fashioned starch (Ironing spray, firm finish) I will be bringing this as well, just in case.
- Very sharp, very small scissors
- A #4 round paintbrush. (I will bring)
- A very small container with a lid. (An empty prescription bottle works well)
- Sketchbook (for note taking, drawing etc.)
- Regular pencil w/eraser
- Colored pencils (optional)


SH11-006 - Improv Blocks

6-Hour Workshop - \$95 12 pm - 6 pm EDT, Friday, March 28

A block is the most standard unit used to create a quilt. I view "blocks" and "parts" as one and the same. There are so many ways to approach making a block, and an infinite number of ways to assemble them.

You can achieve a result that makes the "block" component less obvious to define, and that's what this workshop is all about... Creating simple or complex blocks/parts that you can most certainly assemble without engineering challenges, and ultimately, create a dynamic piece of art. (Of course, for those of you who are already comfortable with improv, you may choose a more complicated method of construction. This is very welcome in this workshop - anything goes!

All Levels



- 100% cotton fabric, preferably solids LIGHT/MED/DARK VALUES FOR EACH COLOR (details below)
 - At least one yard each of various neutral colors. (see below)
 - Sewing machine (with knee-lift if you have one)
 - Needles (I like SCHMETZ Microtex Sharps 70/10)
 - Neutral thread for piecing (I suggest very light gray)
 - Seam ripper, scissors and thread snippers
 - Rotary cutter (with extra blade)
 - Ruler
 - Cutting Mat (at least 24" for cutting width of fabric)
 - Iron and tabletop iron pad (travel size is good)
- Small spray bottle (This is for water and a fine mist is best. You can find this at most art supply stores)
 - Sketchbook (for note taking, drawing etc.)
 - Regular pencil
 - White pencil
 - White flannel/batting for your design wall

You will be using solid colored fabric in this workshop. Also, you may choose your palette in advance and purchase multiple values in each color you use. For example, If you like blue, make sure you bring a very dark blue value, a very light, and a few shades in between if possible. It's more important to bring multiple values of a few colors, than a bunch of different colors.

Neutral fabric is always good to have on hand. I suggest bringing grays and/or taupes (warm and cool). The main thing is to have options.

SH11-007 Seams Out Quilted Pillow

6-Hour Workshop - \$105 12 pm - 6 pm EDT, Thursday, March 27

Add surface texture and design to a modern quilted pillow by including the quarter-inch seams on the outside.

MAKE A MODERN AND TACTILE QUILTED PILLOW

We usually hide our quarter-inch seam allowances on the back of our quilts, but that's a missed opportunity for design and texture. In the Seams-Out Quilted Pillow workshop, we'll make those seams an integral part of the design, adding an artistic touch.

We will make two strip sets, slice and splice them together, and then use the quilt-as-you-go technique and a walking foot to

quickly create sumptuous, quilted fabric. Next, we'll turn that fabric into the front and back of a fabulous, quilted pillow. You'll also learn to put in an invisible zipper!

Participants will receive guidance for choosing fabric colors, textures and printed designs that allow the seams-out texture to really shine. Once you have the technique down, you can apply the seams-out idea to all kinds of quilted projects.



- Choosing complimentary fabrics for an attractive result
- Sewing strip sets with seams on the front
- Quilt-as-you-go method, using your domestic machine and a walking foot
- How to sew an invisible zipper
- Precision sewing tips for a professional finish

A complete PDF supply list will be provided. Class sizes are limited to ensure one-on-one time. This is an all-levels class. You should be comfortable using your sewing machine and walking foot (or dual feed), and both should be in good working order. Basic knowledge of walking foot quilting is helpful, but not necessary. - Zipper: 18" (or longer) invisible plastic zipper.

- Small scissors and fabric shears, seam ripper
- Cutting mat
- 24-inch quilting ruler
- Fine Sharpie or fabric marking pen
- Quilting pins

- Wooden chopstick for turning

SH11-008 Scraptastic Quilted Cards

3-Hour Workshop - \$95 12 pm - 3 pm EDT, Friday, March 28

Grab a handful of fabric scraps, and let's make some art!

MAKE MINI QUILTED COMPOSITIONS INTO ARTFUL GREETING CARDS

3 hours: Your scrap bin is a great and underused resource! It's often full of beautiful fabrics, but in very small amounts. Sometimes it contains mistakes that we would rather toss into the scrap bin than unpick. It's time to dive in and make something beautiful from those off-cuts and whoopsies.


Using just a few pieces of fabric pulled from scraps, we will machine sew a mini series of modern art cards. We'll

explore color, scale of print, value, and texture... and maybe come up with some surprising combinations!









Using heavyweight stabilizer as our canvas, we'll stitch down small compositions using the quilt as you go method. Then we'll add surface design and linear texture with our sewing machines and colorful threads.

I'll share my recommendations for greeting card blanks, plastic sleeves (if you want to package the cards to sell), and framing ideas to make your compositions into a quick and impressive hangable piece of wall art.

ZOOM WORKSHOP DETAILS

- Grab a handful of scraps as a jumping off point.
- Curate and refine your fabric selection into hue (color) and value (light, medium, dark).
- Solids and subtle, small-scale prints or textures work best, but it's also fun to mix in a
 dramatic print.
- Cut heavyweight stabilizer into 4 x 6-inch rectangles, this is our foundation to sew on.
- Sew a couple of strip sets combing the color you like.
- Trim up a few pieces of the fabrics you like into small rectangles. Now you're ready to create!
- Using the quilt-as-you-go technique we will sew from the inside out, adding a piece at a time onto the stabilizer.
- Explore further ideas strip piecing and leaving the raw edges visible for extra texture.
- Square up your composition so it is 4 x 6 again.
- Add extra surface design and texture with mock quilting in colorful thread.
- Slide your mini artwork into a greeting card blank and use double-stick tape to secure.
- I'll also demonstrate how to sew a larger composition and then cut it up into sections that can be framed individually or as a group.

A complete PDF supply list will be provided. Class sizes are limited to ensure one-on-one time. This is an all-levels class. You should be comfortable using your sewing machine and it should be in good working order. Basic knowledge of sewing/quilting is helpful, but not necessary. We will learn together!

Students to Provide

- Hand dyes, unprinted batiks, and prints with random color placement, muted striations work very well for landscapes: greens, blues, browns, tans, purples. A variety of these are needed to create a varied layout of hills and plains. Each piece should be about 3"h by 10" long.

- Sky fabric about 4"h x 10" long which has no defined clouds printed on it.
- Path fabric in blotchy tan or brown.

- 3 values of threads in brown, green, white and any other colors you may wish to use (i.e., flowers) 40 to 50wt poly
- Common sewing tools
- Pencil

SH11-010 Tiffany Stained-Glass Window

6-Hour Workshop - \$75 12 pm - 6 pm EDT, Friday, March 28

Learn this incredible no-sew technique for making leaded lines, easily, in any shape, to be used with fabrics for a stained-glass effect! You might choose to quilt the background, but it's not necessary. The process is to hand cut shapes and fuse them in place. The pattern is a suggestion, you may simplify and modify it as you wish.

All Levels

Students to Provide

- 2 copies of the enlarged pattern (at least 15x20), batting of your choice 2" larger on all sides than your pattern (not necessary if you won't be quilting)
- Matching thread for background quilting
- Heavy duty Wonder Under or Heat n Bond (at least 2 yards)
- Steam iron
- Pressing cloth as required by the direction on your heavy duty fusible
- Background fabric for sky and water (Bonnie used an ombre fabric to get the repeat of colors in the sky and water)
- 1 yard of solid black fabric
- Blotchy fabrics of your choice for the stained glass effects (in hills, tree trunks, magnolia flowers, irises, flower stems, etc.) estimate amounts according to pattern size
- Sharp, small and large scissors
- A pencil

If you plan to quilt the background, add a sewing machine, batting and backing fabric to your supplies This piece may be made on just your sky and water fabric, and mounted as you wish.

Learn to free motion quilt on your own machine in the comfort of your home! I provide a supportive and fun atmosphere and show numerous quilts, photos, and samples to illustrate what I teach. We will work on 5 beautiful and fun motifs that you can put on your own quilts using your home sewing machine. I call myself Encourager-in-Chief and I KNOW you can free motion quilt!

All Levels

Students to Provide

- Your best machine for free motion quilting.
- Manual for machine. Please make sure you know how to set up your machine for free motion quilting before class.
- Free Motion foot for your machine open-toed is preferred but not required. Use a closed
 toe foot if that's what you have. The foot usually has a spring on it. You do need a specific
 free motion foot for the class if you're not sure, please check with your dealer. You cannot
 free motion quilt without the right foot; your machine may not have come with a free motion

- 6 quilt "sandwiches" from *quality* fabric and batting, about 14" square 1 3/4 yds of fabric will yield 6 sandwiches. Fabric should be solid or near solid so that you can see your stitches. Your sandwiches will have 3 layers: fabric, batting, fabric. A thin batting works best. Baste layers together using your preferred method (spray, pins, etc.). No odd-shaped sandwiches or prints please.
- Quality thread, preferred 50 or 60 weight. If you go out and buy thread, Aurifil is a good choice, it behaves well.
- Wound bobbin (same thread choices as above).
- Extra empty bobbin.
- Size 80/12 topstitch needles for your machine.
- Scissors or snips.
- Other free motion notions that you normally use at home.
- 3 paper towels or 6 if you have the half-square ones.
- 10 -15 pieces of unlined paper
- Note taking supplies.

Helpful:

- The bed extender that came with your machine if you have one.
- Other free motion quilting supplies that you like: slider, gloves, etc.
- Straight stitch throat plate.

Beginner - Confident Beginner Level

Students to Provide

- Your best machine for free motion quilting.
- Manual for machine. Please know how to set up your machine for free motion before class.
- Free Motion foot for your machine open-toed is preferred but not required. Use a closed toe foot if that's what you have. The foot usually has a spring on it. You do need a specific free motion foot for the class if you're not sure, please check with your dealer. You cannot free motion quilt without the right foot; your machine may not have come with a free motion foot. You cannot do the class without a free motion foot.
- Put the free motion foot on your machine and lower the needle to make sure it fits and works with your machine. Your quilt sandwich should move freely under a lowered presser foot with your feed dogs down.
- 6 quilt "sandwiches" from *quality* fabric and batting, about 14" square 1 5/8 yds of fabric will yield 6 sandwiches. Fabric should be solid or near solid so that you can see your stitches. Your sandwiches will have 3 layers: fabric, batting, fabric. A thin batting works best.
- Baste layers together using your preferred method (spray, pins, etc.). No odd-shaped sandwiches or prints please.
- Blue wash out marker or white marker if your fabric is dark.
- Quality thread preferred 50 60 weight. If you're going to go buy thread for class, I would suggest Aurifil 50 weight it behaves well.
- Wound bobbin (same thread choices as above).
- Size 80/12 needles, topstitch preferred.
- Quilters ruler 12" or so used to mark grids and lines for border work.
- Scissors or snips.
- 3 paper towels or 6 if you have the half-square ones.
- Unlined paper, letter size.

Helpful:

- The bed extender that came with your machine if you have one.
- Other free motion quilting supplies that you like: slider, gloves, etc.
- Straight stitch throat plate.
